| RE Lam Special | • Is aware of and interested in their own and others' physical characteristics, pointing to and naming features such as noses, hair and eyes | Knows their own name, their preferences and interests and is becoming aware of their unique abilities | -Using mirrors to see how we are special. - Experiments with what their bodies can do through setting themselves physical challenges, e.g. pulling a large truck upstairs Begins to use me, you and I in their talk and to show awareness of their social identity of gender, ethnicity and ability
- Shows their growing sense of self through asserting their likes and dislikes, choices, decisions, and ideas. These may be different to those of the adult or their peers; often saying no, me do it or mine
- Is developing an understanding of and interest in differences of gender, ethnicity and ability Shows a sense of autonomy through asserting their ideas and preferences and making choices and decisions
- Experiments with their own and other people's views of who they are through their play, through trying out different behaviours, and the way they talk about themselves
- Is gradually learning that actions have consequences but not always the consequences the child hopes for

- -Look at our favourite things (food, colours, toys)
- -Talk about our emotions and what makes up happy and sad.
- -Talk about things we are good at.
